
Laura once had lunch with Micheal Schumacher in 2001 at the Silverstone Grand Prix!

Charlotte achieved 1st place and a new personal best in her first ever event competing at Level 2.




Table Tennis


Gymnastics

S6 Choose to Support Beatson Cancer Charity

Each year, the Sixth Year choose a charity to raise money for throughout their final year in school. S6 pupils have the opportunity to nominate a charity which they would like to raise money for, and a vote then takes place to decide which charity will be selected. All the charities suggested this year were for very worthwhile causes, but the clear winner was Beatson Cancer Charity.

The Turret interviewed two S6 pupils, Poppy and Gemma, who were the main supporters behind choosing Beatson:

Why did you decide to put this particular charity forward?

Gemma: I chose this charity because it's very close to my family's hearts. My dad passed away 5 years ago from cancer and received treatment at the Beatson. My Grandpa also received treatment from the Beatson when I was younger. The Beatson is an important charity that will benefit greatly from the support we can raise throughout the year.

Poppy: I chose the chairty as it was where my uncle received his treatment for his MSD (blood cancer). Although he was not cured, it helped give him more time and more freedom than being bound in a regular hospital room, this really helped to boost our morale as a family.

What do you hope to achieve by fundraising for Beatson?

Gemma: I really hope we are able to raise enough to make a good change for the hospital, possibly even allow them to get a new scanner or just to make an impact on their equipment and support for their patients.

Poppy: I hope to raise enough money to ensure Beatson is still around for years to come to help every other family who may need it.

What does Beatson mean to you?

Gemma: It means a lot to me because of their treatment they were able to offer my family on a few occasions.

Poppy: The Beatson meant that we were able to see my uncle as the person he was before he was affected with cancer and although it didn't cure him, it made his last days exponentially better than it would have been if the Beatson was not around.

Are there any other comments you would like to add?

Gemma: I want to encourage everyone to get involved with all activities and if anyone has any fundraising ideas, please let a sixth year know!

Poppy: I want to thank everyone who has already joined in on donating whether it's from the house charity days or just contributing by bringing in money for the non-uniform day we held before Christmas. We couldn't make this possible without them!



Judges including Muriel Gray, Geri Horner and Simon Reeve, looked at thousands of entries from across the UK and were particularly inspired by Isla's vision for a healthy earth with vibrant plant life and the use of sustainable resources.

Isla and her mum travelled to London and bumped elbows with Boris Johnson at Number 10 before being treated to an evening of film, music and dance to inspire action on climate change.

In times where travel is challenging, the exchange of project work is helping keep pupils connected across Europe. It gives them the opportunity to use their increasingly important digital communication skills, stay in touch and enhance their learning.

We updated the quality label winning 'Stars Across Europe' Christmas diamond exchange for Europe on the Move and diamonds are winging their way to us from France, Poland, Germany, Belgium and Slovenia. We can't wait to put them together as multi-national six pointed festive decorations for our classrooms.

All of the diamonds were made by the pupils and the five sets of 6 were sent recently in School Christmas cards.

All of Primary 6 have written and displayed colour poems for one activity. The poems from all countries will be made into an eBook.

Erasmus funding facilitated the purchase of Lego Spike Prime robotic kits - some of which are available for use by the Junior School. Mr Currie, IT teacher, treated the Club to a workshop recently and within 45 minutes they were having a 'hopper' race. Much fun was had by all! The Lego kits will feature in Europe on the Move's RobOlympics over the next two years. Who knows, club members might travel to Germany for the final in 2023?



















UK German Connection Bears Project

Two months after connecting the classrooms of our Junior School pupils in P4B and the Meerkat class at Nordmarkt-Grundschule in Dortmund, Germany, the children are thoroughly enjoying exchanging ideas with our new friends.

P4B children wrote letters to each of the children in Dortmund, answering all 43 questions they were sent and asking some of their own.

Isla, our Scottish bear at Nordmarkt-Grundschule is helping translate one of them. There was great delight in seeing that their letters had reached their destination. Marco is treated as a full class member and even joined in with our Halloween party. Count Marcula should have won a prize!

The two classes are currently learning about each other's Christmas traditions and exchanging worksheets and posters to show what they have learned. The Meerkat class is particularly keen on learning about our naughty 'elf on the shelf' who is currently entertaining us in the school dining-room.

They are excited at the prospect of an online meet-up to see one another in person and to sing Christmas songs together. The children have been learning the words for Tannenbaum, Stille Nacht and In der Weihnachtsbäckerei with the help of senior pupils on keyboard and our German Assistant, Fraulein Lipecki.

After Christmas we will continue our collaboration with future topics such as features of our towns and cities, days of the week, months and seasons, food, clothes and sport.

Senior Erasmus News

Erasmus+ is a European Commission funded programme which supports international project work. Our pupils have previously collaborated with young people in schools across Europe.

Erasmus activities are an important part of the international collaboration that Wellington pupils enjoy and this term some new opportunities have been offered.

P7 French

Our girls and boys in Primary 7 have been putting their French to good use. Each pupils has a pen pal in the Belgian section of the SHAPE school in Mons, Belgium. They have exchanged two letters in French and one in English and have found out a little about their partners' lives. This is the third year that our Primary 7 classes have worked with pupils from Mons. Next year, some of our pupils will meet the boys and girls from the Belgian school during Erasmus mobilities.





Europe - on the Move!

Our new project is called 'Europe - on the Move!' and we have started developing skills for the joint activities with our partners in Belgium, France, Germany, Poland and Slovenia. The Art Department has taken delivery of iMacs which will allow our pupils to learn about computer-aided design. Sixty looms have also arrived in Art and next term our S1 pupils will weave tapestries inspired by the colours of the Ayrshire countryside. Their development work has included paper-weaving and colour studies









Erasmus Club Film Makers

Budding film makers have been learning to use our new Erasmus video camera during the Friday Erasmus Club sessions. Next steps will include learning to edit their films so that they are soon able to take charge of making a video record of our Erasmus activities.





Lego Spike Kits

The arrival of 15 Lego Spike kits in Computing has caused great excitement. These kits will help our pupils to develop programming and problemsolving skills through a series of challenges which they will undertake in competition with our partner schools. In 2023 we hope to lift the medals in our six nations Robolympics.



Quality Label for Joint Project

Our joint project with the Mallinckrodt-Gymnasium in Dortmund finished in the Autumn. 'Celebrating Success' focused on celebrating the success of our partnership which is now in its fourth decade. We were delighted to receive a Quality Label from Germany for the high standard of our project work.





Last term, in many ways, reflected the last eighteen or so months. We returned in August having to follow more, Covid restrictions and having to incorporate a number of mitigations into our working day but, nevertheless, the Junior School had an incredibly positive term. Our numbers rose slightly from last year and for the first time in several years, we have two Primary 1 classes. They have almost been the standard bearers, going on trips, visiting Dowhill Farm and using our outdoor facilities at Doonside. Mitigations and Guidance have not dampened their enthusiasm. P4 have been busy through, the Erasmus project, speaking to, and singing with, children in Germany. P5 had a great day out at the Roundhouse at Whithorn.

Our first 'big event' in some time was the Harvest Thanksgiving Service at St Columba Church. An almost full house with parents in attendance, excellent readings and singing and a warmth that has been sadly missing for so long was very evident. The positivity was short lived, though, as we were unable to hold the Christmas Service, my own favourite event of the year, or have parents watch our excellent Nativity plays. However, the nursery staff and the P1-3 staff excelled themselves and helped the children put on two excellent Nativities. I would like to thank Aimee (Marketing) and Garry (IT) for recording and editing the plays. I am sure they will be keepsakes for parents and children for many years.

I am delighted to say that I have visited both Primary 1 classes on numerous occasions and have had the joy of seeing many of the children progress from reading single sounds to reading books. This is a huge step for them and I was so proud of them all Equally, I was just as proud of our Head Boy, Lewis, and our Head Girl, Sophie, for their excellent readings at the Harvest Service. Lewis told me it was more nerve-wracking than doing a Nativity play, but you would never have known, such was the quality of his reading. Very well done to both him and Sophie. Things such as this are taken for granted here but, in fact, this was the first time we had been in church since Christmas 2019.

After the Harvest Service, some P6s visited the Ayrshire Foodbank, taking a huge amount of donations to them - thank you so much for your support. They were given a tour and were told how the whole operation works. We all left feeling very humble and so grateful that we were able to help the organisation.

Our Remembrance Day Service took on a different slant, again, this year. Parents and children were met with a huge river of poppies flowing from the topmost window in the Junior School when arriving at the school and following Covid guidelines, we held our service in the playground. This touching service was attended by parents from the school railings. They were glowing in their praise for the respect shown by the children and the bugle playing of Mr Richmond from the senior school.

As you will read elsewhere, our P6s have been busy filling Smartie Tubes with pound coins in return for doing

work and chores around the house. They deserve a huge 'thanks' for supporting the school charity so well.

Finally, I am hopeful that the Spring term will see the Junior School get ever nearer to what it was pre Covid, but no matter what the future holds in that respect, I am always delighted to see our children enjoying life and taking to everything that is asked of them with great aplomb. As always, they are a great credit to everyone who works with them and they will take whatever comes their way and, in their stride to ensure another great term.

The Scottish Youth Parliament elections were held in November last year. Wellington pupils participated in this event along with local authority schools and other independent schools across Scotland. The Youth Parliament allows young people to raise awareness of issues they care about and communicate key messages to politicians in power at Holyrood.

Biology Virtual interactive Session

Higher and Advanced Higher Biology pupils took part in a virtual interactive session where they met Dr Jenny Fraser who is a Senior Lecturer in Veterinary Biomedical Sciences at Edinburgh University and a scientist at The Roslin Institute in Edinburgh. She talked about her research into different diseases, including ageing, stroke and irritable bowel disease and her current work that focuses on prostate cancer and how it evolves. Her research hopes to identify "biomarkers" for prostate cancer; molecules like proteins and DNA that we can detect in blood samples from cancer patients. She is also working with doctors at the Western General Hospital in Edinburgh, and hopes that the research will lead to more personalised treatments for men with prostate cancer.

This session gave our Biologists an opportunity to learn about some of the science happening here in Scotland, and hear about different career paths to increase pupils' curiosity in STEM, help raise awareness of STEM careers and support pupils to reflect on their own science-related skills.









Excellence in Music has been one of the most significant themes of Wellington school over recent decades. The instrumental staff body has increased significantly in recent years as the demand for one to one music tuition grows. Our Director of Music, Mr Godsman spoke to the Turret to provide an update of the Music department and their recent events.

The Music department has had a busy first term back at Wellington School this academic year and it has been fantastic to get back to music making in the classroom, in our instrumental lessons, ensembles and even some performances. It's been great to get back to class singing again in the Junior School, and we've loved singing our hearts out in our choral classes, learning new songs, and performing at Harvest and The Christmas Concert. We've also been able to restart all of our ensembles again – which means Junior Choir, Senior Choir, The Madrigal Singers, Jazz Band, Junior String Orchestra, Folk Group, Music Theatre Group and Senior Orchestra have all been able to rehearse each week, and work towards showcasing our Whole School Christmas Concert, albeit an online recorded version. However, big progress with small steps forward and we're sure, with a few more steps forward, you'll get to hear us perform live again soon!

We've been able to acknowledge and celebrate our students musical successes with awarding Colours to students from Primary 7 through to Secondary 6, who have shown exceptional ability and commitment to their musical learning recently. In addition to this, we have recently hosted Trinity College (London) Music Examinations in the department, with some superb results from our students. Instrumental Lessons continue on a weekly basis, and another significant step forward has taken place, allowing these lessons to take place face to face now. Some 196 lessons take place on a weekly basis, across our 15 instrumental teachers!

In the classroom, we continue to see Google Classroom be embedded in our daily musical activities, to help the learning transition from home learning to school learning, and students are really engaged in a wide range of musical activities with learning technologies. Music Technology students taking N5, Higher and Advanced Higher Music have seen significant investment in equipment and software to support their learning, with new iMac computers, running the latest versions of Logic and Pro Tools, which will make a big difference to their skill acquisition and productivity in class. In addition to this, the Junior School and Choral classes now have access to Sing Up!, an online library full of singing resources, and we have also put in place Noteflight score writing software and Focus on Sound to help our certificate classes with listening, literacy and theory.

Next term, we look forward to preparing our students for the Ayrshire Music Festival, Burns Celebrations, welcoming our visiting examiners for N5 and Higher Performing examinations, a range of Solo Concerts, a Spring Ensembles Concert and the hosting of the British Suzuki Music Association.


As always, November was full of differnt activities dedicated to educating our pupils about both World Wars

The Junior school also created a poppy waterfall around the turrets of the Junior School building.










Primary 7 pupils had the pleasure of meeting Gareth, who came in as part of Remembrance Day events and to help the class on their World War II topic.

A Note from the Editor


We hope you enjoyed this winter edition of The Turret. This biannual magazine aims to capture the essence of Wellington School.
