Christmas in Dortmund By Emelia Ewer

In late November, 36 Wellington pupils from S1-S3 spent a week on Exchange at the Mallinckrodt-Gymnasium, Dortmund, Germany. Emelia writes about her experiences here.

My stay in Germany was amazing. It was my first time going abroad without my parents so I was very nervous before I went but I had a really great time and will feel much more confident going away next time. It felt like quite a long journey to get there but it gave me the opportunity to speak to people in my year on the trip that I hadn't had the chance to chat with as much since they started at Wellington. That was an aspect of the trip I hadn't expected and really enjoyed.

When we got to Düsseldorf airport, we all got on the bus and headed to the hotel where we were to meet our German families. When we first got to the hotel, I was getting a bit worried because I couldn't see my family or my suitcase. A few moments later, I found my suitcase but still not my family. It was a couple minutes and then my German family came up to me and said 'hello'. I was surprised at how well they could speak English. It was a short car journey to my family's house which was very pretty. It had a cellar and three floors. I never went in the cellar or the top floor but the other two floors I went on frequently. The first night things seemed unfamiliar and I missed my big sister but the family made me very welcome and helped me settle in.

It was the first night and all was going well. The next day, we were going to take the train to one of the cities called Cologne. Sadly, on that day, the Christmas market was shut because it was a Sunday and it was 'Totensonntag'. It was sad because the Christmas market looked very good! It took about an hour to get from the train station to Cologne. We went with Ella, Grace, Felix and their families. It was fun to take the trip in a group with plenty of people to chat to. We went to the Cathedral which was amazing and very tall. We climbed up to the top of it and got some good pictures. I was glad that I am not afraid of heights! We looked around the Cathedral and inside the church part then went to the Lindt chocolate museum. We went in and then started queuing when the fire alarm went off! We were then waiting outside in the rain for a while dreaming of chocolate. Then, when we finally got inside we got to go straight through because the families had already paid for the tickets. The museum was actually very informative. It gave you all of the ways that Lindt makes the chocolate from getting the beans to making it into chocolate. We went through quite guickly then went to the chocolate tasting section. There was a Lindt chocolate fountain! Oh my gosh, the chocolate was good! The chef stuck some wafers in and then gave it to us. It was delicious. I did need to lick my hand because the chef accidentally dropped the wafer on my hand. It was alright though. I sanitised my hand afterwards. After we had finished up in the museum, we walked to a restaurant to have a drink before we went back on the train back to the house. Ella, Felix and I went while Grace and her partner waited for their chocolate sculptures. Ella, Felix and I kept walking at our normal pace and we always ended up at the front. I don't know whether that was because we are really fast walkers or if the others were just slow. We will never know. When we got to the restaurant, it was pouring down with rain. We were sitting outside but there was a waterproof surrounder so that we didn't get wet. We had our drinks and then we needed to go to the toilet. When we went, it turned out that we needed to pay for it. We started to go in then the lady told us that we needed to pay but we didn't have any cash. We started to walk away when the lady said that we could just go in anyway.

On Monday, it had been two nights. We drove to school and the first activity was an Ice breaker activity. It was really fun because we did the most random things like put a certain number of body parts on the floor and we were in a group of a certain number of people. We then had a tour of the school and then a selfie tour of Dortmund Christmas Market. On Tuesday, we went to the Wuppertal Schwebebahn Museum and went on the suspension railway. We also went to the local Christmas market. On Wednesday, we attended

the first two lessons, which were art, and then went to Phoenix de Lumieres. Then we did an art project on the Hundertwasser art show. Thursday was the workshop day. We created our own computer game, wrote a Scottish and German fairytale, learned about Christmas across the World and we did either a battle of the cultures or played football. I chose the battle of the cultures and it was really fun. We played different games from different countries. We did some social dancing as well which was really fun. Friday was then our last day. We attended the first two lessons, English, and then went to the Borussia Dortmund stadium. It was really great. We did walk there and back but it was fine. There was a recording studio which my friends and I spent most of our time in. We did many karaoke songs that were in German without knowing any of the words or the tune to them, but it was still fun.

The last day was very sad. I had had such a lovely time and I was wanting to go home but I didn't want to at the same time. It was nice to go home though. Overall, I had such an amazing experience with going to Germany and it has given me a lot more confidence when going away without my parents.




Who am I and why am I here?

- Collected when some of my family members were abroad.








Coin used in Guinea between 1830-1940



French Empire 60 cents from 1835










This Japanese box from Japan after WW2.

A year with WSPTA

The Wellington School Parent Teacher Association (WSPTA) is led by a committee of parents and teachers from all stages of the school – nursery, primary and senior.

Throughout the year, the PTA hold a number of fund-raising events. In 2023 these included Halloween discos, and the hugely popular Summer and Christmas Concerts. The PTA also raise funds through the organisation and running of the Uniform thrift shop.

WSPTA Chair, Laura Alexander caught up with us to let us know how 2023 went:

We've had an extremely busy year. We started off with our very successful Ceilidh which was held in the beautiful location of Boswell Coach House and raised over £6,000!

We supported the Junior School in May to hold a Coronation celebration: this included games, parades and refreshments.

In the month of June we supported the school at the Sports Day, providing a tuck shop for both pupils and guests.

Our WSPTA Summer Concert was held at Ayr Town Hall and was very well received by parents and guests. Pimms and canapés were very much enjoyed before the musical performances.

In October and December the Junior School enjoyed Halloween and Christmas parties in which the WSPTA helped provide snacks and decorations.

Our final event of the year was a Christmas concert at Ayr Town Hall. We welcomed guests with Christmas punch and mince pies. The music department showcased how talented our pupils really are!

All these events would not be possible without the help and support from all the Committee members and Teachers. I would like to personally thank them all very much for their support throughout the year.

The money raised from all our events have allowed us to support the school with some fantastic purchases. Our biggest purchase has been new Headsets and Microphones for our Music department, the cost of this being well into five figures. These have been very well received and enhanced the school shows, the most recent being Mary Poppins and P7 pantomime.

A new Hockey Goalkeeper kit was purchased for the PE department. Smaller purchases have been new football kits and balls for our Junior School Football Team.

A Drum Screen was purchased for the music department, beanbags for the Junior school library, plants for the chill zone and an LED projector also for the Music Department.

Our Thrift Shop plays a huge part in the funding of purchases for the school. With its new location in Carleton Turrets, we have sales planned throughout 2024. These dates can be found on the school calendar.

EPAS at Wellington By S3 Junior Ambassadors

In October, Wellington School joined the European Parliament Ambassador Schools Programme. This is open to young people in schools in the European Union member states and former member states. The programme encourages young people to engage in active participation in democracy and citizenship activities in their school communities and beyond.

Our Junior Ambassadors meet once a week to plan and organise events for pupils in the school. In the Autumn Term our Ambassadors represented the programme at our Open Evening and talked to parents, pupils and friends of the school about what it offers.

In December, our S3 Ambassadors delivered an informative presentation about languages in the workplace to their year group. They demonstrated how learning a language can open doors and help in later life.

Anastasia, Blair, Freya, and Jess spoke about different careers that involve foreign languages and about the opportunities young people can consider related to areas of study or work. The S3 audience were made aware of some job opportunities that are available that use languages, but are not commonly associated with learning or speaking a foreign language, such as working for GCHQ or for an accountancy firm.

The S3 pupils took part in interactive activities which gauged their understanding of career opportunities both before and after the presentation. All of the participants learned a great deal about languages in the workplace and how these can be used as part of a career and when studying or travelling and how languages help with making connections with people.

Feedback from the S3 pupils was extremely positive and many commented on the video interviews they had watched where a range of careers were represented. They enjoyed finding out about the job opportunities available to them where knowledge of foreign languages enhances prospects and about the challenges that speakers had to overcome as language learners.

Our Junior Ambassadors have further exciting projects in the pipeline for 2024.

Showjumping

S6 pupil Fergal has had a very successful 6 month in Showjumping. Back in September, Fergal was selected by the British Showjumping Association to compete for Great Britain at the FEI Jumping Youth Nations Cup in Austria, where he won in his class.

Fergal then claimed victoryin the Under 25 group at 130 Grand Prix Arena UK, where he won with his 8 year old mare- Karima. Fergal rounded up the year competing at Northcote in Blackburn back in November and qualified for the London International Horse Show.

Rugby



An important part of Wellington life is giving pupils the opportunity to try new sports and grow existing skills. Over the past several years the schools Netball teams have grown dramatically, with seven teams playing in the Ayrshire schools league; and most recently four teams competing in the Scottish Cup.

Recent Achievements

Since Netball training began several years ago at Wellington, Miss Duffy, a PE teacher and S3/4 Year Head, has headed it. With participation from pupils Miss Duffy has been able to enter teams from P7-S6 into an Ayrshire league.

Last year our S1/2 first team won the Ayrshire league. This is the first team to ever do this at Wellington. It was an amazing achievement and gave pupils the chance to compete at a high level.

Pupils have also had the opportunity to trial for the Ayrshire District Squads, with many of them being successful in the trial. Over the last few years, we have had twelve pupils selected across both the U15 and U17 age group. This squad gives young people the opportunity to be seen by Scottish Netball coaches and grow their netball path. It also allows pupils to make new friends and grow relationships which they will have for the rest of their lives.

Current Season

The 2023/24 Netball Season has been going well so far, with all teams putting in hard work on and off the court. Currently, four out of seven of our teams remain undefeated and are on track for another promising season.

This year, four teams have been entered into the Scottish Cup. Our S1 team won their first round and progressed in the Cup, whilst our other three teams progressed in the Plate. This competition saw teams travelling across Scotland to compete in high level competition. Our S3 Team are through to the Quarter Final of the plate.

Opportunities

The introduction of Netball to Wellington has allowed pupils to discover skills and friendships they otherwise would not have. The life skills which participation in sport can give you is amazing and allows all pupils to improve in many aspects of their life.
















Emily And Kathryn Take On The Channel By Ross Gibb

On the 12th Of December 2023, two S6 Pupils (Emily & Kathryn Taylor) challenged themselves to swim a combined length of the English Channel in an effort to raise money for the S6 chosen Charity, Diabetes UK. They completed their swim at the Citadel in Ayr, swimming around 33 km or 1344 lengths of the pool! This challenge took them 10 hours & 21 minutes to complete and they managed to raise a huge £2460 for Diabetes UK.

Why did they want to do the swim and why did they choose that length to swim?

Both Emily and Kathryn wanted to do their part to support the S6 chosen charity and wanted to organise a sponsored event. As competitive SAST swimmers, they thought that a swimming event would be "the obvious choice". Their reason for choosing the length of the English Channel was because they "wanted a distance not many could do, but also something that was achievable". In addition to that, swimming the Channel is already recognised as a swim that some people challenge themselves to do.

What Preparations did they do for the day?

As competitive swimmers they both already swim multiple times per week on a regular basis. They "had attended a warm-weather training a couple weeks beforehand" which they say helped them to "build up their endurance". Furthermore they say that food played a big part in their training, saying that "it was mainly carb-loading in the days before the swim" to make sure they had enough energy for the swim and it was also important that they "had the right food to snack on during the day".

How was their experience swimming on the day?

Emily says that she "found the physical part of the swimming ok actually", finding the biggest challenge to be "the boredom that came with counting so many lengths and focusing as to not lose count". Explaining that if her mind wandered, she would lose count of the lengths she had already swam, which was "really annoying" for her.

Kathryn found that energy levels in the morning started out "pretty high" and she was excited to get started. Finding "the most important thing to be settling into a rhythm while swimming" so that she didn't deplete her energy too quickly. She says that in the final quarter, she could feel the exhaustion kicking in but all she could do was keep going. The final 400 lengths felt like they "were in the home stretch so things got easier".

How did they feel after the swim? Would they do it again?

Emily found that she "was absolutely exhausted, and excited to go home and have some proper food that wasn't gummy bears!". She would like to do it again some day but would like to wait a couple of years till she forgets how strenuous and long it was. Hoping to work up to doing it on her own some day.

Kathryn says that she felt "so relieved and excited after finally finishing the swim". After spending over 10 hours in the pool, she couldn't believe that they had finally completed it. She honestly "was looking forward to going home afterwards and getting a good sleep". She would definitely like to do it again despite how difficult she found it, explaining that the feeling she had after realising that they had completed it was "incomparable".

Emily and Kathryn would both like to give a big thank you to everyone who came to support them at the poolside and especially to their mum who was there for the entire day, counted the lengths for them and almost walked as far as they swam!

After Legally Blonde:

When the curtain fell on Legally Blonde and we said our tearful goodbyes to another fantastic generation of sixth year performers, we began to focus our attentions toward the new show which would be performed on the same Gaiety Theatre stage that we had come to love so much, and had so many incredible memories on. The Music department teased about the potential shows Wellington would be doing for a good few weeks, until one fateful Friday... where Mrs Docherty told us there was a hint in her room that would reveal what our next theatre adventure would be. The Casting:

In contrast to Legally Blonde, the audition process felt a little more relaxing this time around. We had new faces to impress, and the choice of a different character to play. Our auditions came and went- and the dreaded wait for the castlist began. As Sister Act was our last show, we all hoped for the characters we were given. I received the cast list whilst at supported Study for history... And when I learned I was going to be playing Mother Superior, I was ecstatic. This was a role I knew would challenge me, I would have fun with and I grew closer to people I wasn't as close with before.

Rehearsal Process:

Our new producer for this show was Martin. His wife Lynne, would be our Choreographer. Our cast clicked with Martin and Lynne almost immediately, and our relationships with them developed over the few months we had to produce Sister Act. Martin is a very talented producer and leaves no small detail out, and his vision helped us put on an incredible show. Lynne is incredibly creative and a fantastic choreographer, helping all the Nuns, who may not have had much dancing experience or not have the most confidence (myself included!) find a love for dancing and learn to embrace mistakes. Rehearsal in the Theatre:

The Shows:

Similarly to Legally Blonde, most of the principals were double cast. Straws were drawn, and I was paired with the incredible Evie, who I can confidently say is an absolute pleasure to work alongside with- and the part of Deloris was made for both her and Jenna. Also, I got to work with Wellington's own Head boy and girl, which was a blast! Thursday's show opened, and Jenna delivered an incredible performance alongside her Mother Superior and my close friend, Emily. The show ran amazingly, and it made me wish Friday, and my turn would come around even quicker!

The feeling of the curtain falling on a successful opening night, and our whole cast hugging each other was a magical moment. Seeing how happy I and everyone else was, really emphasised the importance of the Music department and the talented music staff. Evie and I could not wait to debut our casts' performance on the Friday. Standing in front of all those people and performing with my favourite 'priest' Bobby, Evie and the brilliant Police officer, Max, brought back so much happiness- just like Legally Blonde had done! What differences did you notice between Sister Act and Legally Blonde:

Hugh: "It was a more organised environment, probably due to the fact that more people already had show experience."

Jemima: I felt more relaxed the second time round, probably because it wasn't my first time doing it and I knew my surroundings and the order of things already, so I could focus on other things and not worry about knowing my way around the place. But Sister Act just felt more relaxed and orderly overall compared to Legally, the lack of quick changes definitely helped as well!

Max: Obviously the shows were completely different, we went from pink, law and dogs to nuns and gangsters. But both were equally awesome in their own ways.

Evie: Despite them being completely different kinds of shows in most aspects (unfortunately there were no screaming sorority girls in the convent) I found Sister Act to be more of a slow burner in terms of loving it, but ended up being way more fulfilling! Knowing Legally Blonde inside out before doing it, I already knew I would love the outcome no matter what, but with SA. Not knowing it well made the hard work and end result more satisfying!

Evan: The main thing for me was the show-Sister Act felt more relaxed. Legally Blonde was a little more chaotic. Sister Act was easier to pick up as we had done it before.

Any special memories from Sister Act:

Hugh: "I really enjoyed getting to know Martin and Lynne and the entirety of show week for my favourite memory. I also loved the dress rehearsal where we got to see everything come together for the first time."

Jemima: Oh god there's so many I can't choose! I remember I'd go down to the wings and watch the start of the production every night with the backstage crew, going into everyone's dressing rooms and just chatting, Johnny being the pope the list goes on.

Max: Getting my gear off on the Gaiety stage (again)!

Evie: Honestly most rehearsals produced different memories but overall it was amazing to strengthen the friendships already made during LB and also meet and grow closer with Martin!

Evan: Hugh and I's team talk, and closing night.

What was the Rehearsal process like?

Hugh: It seemed very seamless, and things flowed really nicely.

Max: It was fun and organised. Rather stress free.

Evie: Even though sometimes rehearsals could be hard work, personally I had to be engaged the majority of the time which I think made me enjoy it more. Especially once we began to piece the show together, it was fun to be more involved in different aspects and trying something new each run to develop my own version of Deloris!

Evan: I enjoyed it, for the most part. It was fun! It was nice to catch up with people I hadn't spent a lot of time with, and was so much fun getting to know Martin.

What differences did you notice between the character you played in Legally Blonde and Sister Act?

Hugh: They're quite similar. But, Curtis being a more obvious villain was fun. I thoroughly enjoyed playing both characters.

Jemima: Well for me personally there was quite a difference in singing style but the sort of attitude stayed basically the same. I still don't know how I retained my voice after show week but can't say I'm complaining.

Max: Both characters I played were the 'good guys' who were both reserved and nervous but 'got the girl' in the end.

Evie: Where to start... To be honest, some smaller aspects of Vivienne and Deloris were similar - they are

quite confident characters. The development of both characters throughout the two shows is also relatively similar so that made SA easier. However I don't think Deloris is quite as mean as V was!

Evan: I preferred playing Curtis to Warner quite a lot, I felt like I could get into character much better.

Are you sad Sister Act is over:

Hugh: "Yes, I'd like to do more. Hopefully I'll get to do more at Uni."

Max: Very sad, it was such a great musical and such a brilliant cast, I could have asked for a better last school show to share with such a wonderful group of talented people.

Evie: Very! I think not having the time with the cast and crew is something I miss the most, as well as not having the chance to perform every week. It's a huge commitment, not just physical time but also emotionally. Having the time in theatre for show week definitely made leaving it behind harder as that week is the most intense but also the most rewarding - I definitely had post-show withdrawal!

CENTENARY CELEBRATIONS

The history of Wellington School goes back to 1849, when it opened its doors to twelve 'young ladies of guality'. Mrs Gross, the founder of Wellington, named the school after its address, which at the time, was 22 Wellington Square.

By the turn of the century, the school was bought by Miss Smith and Miss Cay, who purchased additional property in Wellington Square and enhanced the school's academic reputation. This pioneering spirit in girls' education saw numbers steadily rise and in 1923, Wellington School moved to its current site, Carleton Turrets. Wellington are delighted, therefore, to be able to celebrate a very special Centenary this year, as the school has now occupied Carleton Turrets for exactly 100 years!

A hundred years is a long time, and the Wellington School of 2023 is guite different to the one of 1923. The school now welcomes boys and girls aged 3 to 18 and in addition to Carleton turrets, it also occupies the three neighbouring buildings of Craigweil House, Craigweil Lodge and Drumley House. A sports campus and outdoor nursery at Doonside completes the estate and ensure that pupils of all ages have access to appropriate facilities. Despite all the changes and additions, the family spirit that animates Wellington is just as vibrant now as it was 100 years ago.

As part of the Centenary celebrations, Wellington have arranged a programme of events throughout this academic year starting with the Centenary Ball which took place on Saturday 18th November. We were delighted to welcome three hundred former pupils, current pupils, staff, parents, and friends of Wellington at Ayr Racecourse, where the evening began with a drinks reception and music from French teacher and local celebrity, Jermey Levif. Guests then enjoyed a 3 course dinner, dancing to music from Arcadium and games hosted by Primary 7 teacher, Mrs Bradley. All guests thoroughly enjoyed the evening, and it was a good excuse for former pupils to get together and reminisce about their time at Wellington School.

The Centenary Ball ended with an Auction, the proceeds of which went to the Wellington Centenary Appeal. The aim of the appeal is to generate additional funds to support Wellington's comprehensive Bursary programme and their ambitious campus development plans. In the short term, Wellington intend to renovate Carleton Turrets Hall, which is the busiest multi-purpose space in the school. Looking further ahead, the construction of a Sports Hall at Doonside is their primary large-scale objective to meet both the curricular and the extra-curricular needs of the pupils.
